Why Study Economic Crime Investigation?

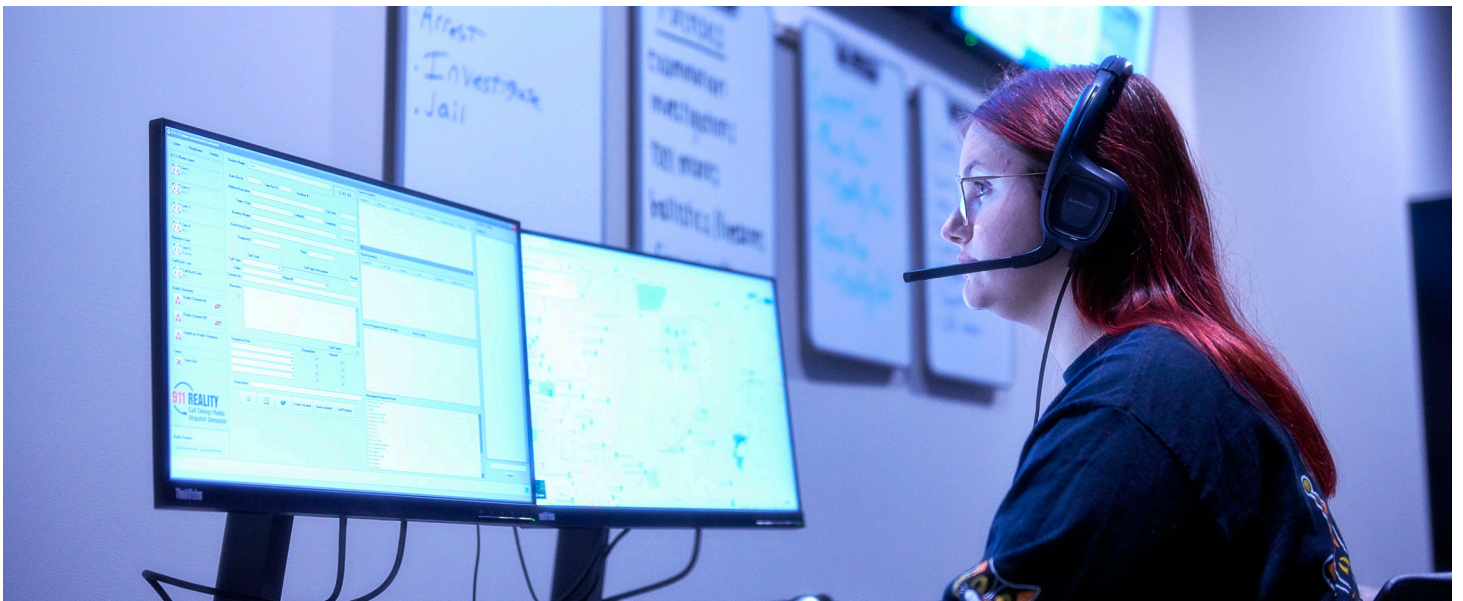

Financial fraud is rapidly becoming one of the most prevalent crimes globally, with criminals employing advanced technology to perpetrate offenses such as identity theft, money laundering, and corporate fraud. These white-collar crimes are increasingly central to global criminal activity, affecting both businesses and individuals. As a result, there's a growing need for professionals with strong accounting, investigative, and tech skills.

Forensic accounting, a key part of economic crime investigation, is projected to grow by 6% from 2023 to 2033, adding over 91,000 new positions nationwide. Employment of financial examiners is expected to rise even faster—by 21%—well above the average for all occupations. A degree in Economic Crime Investigation opens the door to meaningful, in-demand careers where you can make a real difference.
